And the River Drags Her Down

Korean American Soojin and her sister Mirae, like all women in their family, have the power of reviving the dead. Their late mother had warned the sisters against ever using their powers on anything larger than a small animal. Mirae has become Soojin's parental figure since their mother's death. When Mirae dies unexpectedly, Soojin is so lonely and lost without her sister that she dares to break her mother's rules about never using their powers on a human. She is so thrilled to have her sister back that she fails to notice signs that Mirae is not quite the same. She dismisses the dark marks appearing on her own body, and does not make the connection when some of the town's powerful residents are mysteriously attacked.

I love that this novel manages to be equal parts creepy and poignant. While the terror surrounding Mirae's resurrection grows, we see Soojin's profound loneliness, grief, and inability to let go. Yun's writing is incredible, managing to root us in reality while the fantastical unfolds. Some of her strongest writing is the depiction of the friendship between Soojin and the incredibly patient Mark (who has obviously fallen for Soojin), and in her poetic descriptions of natural settings. I also appreciate the nod to elements of Korean culture in the story.

It is remarkable that *And the River Drags Her Down* is Yun's debut novel. The cover art is simply stunning and, happily the story inside lives up to the cover. It is deserving of its Kirkus starred review. And for those who appreciate a local connection, Yun is a resident of Ann Arbor.

Go for the Gold at Zauelympics



Together We Inspire . . .

Race and Riot in 1967 Saginaw

In 1966, the Michigan Civil Rights Commission said that Saginaw was a powder keg about to explode. Housing conditions, redlining, and urban renewal played a significant role in that statement. Redlining was the systemic denial of services (loans, insurance, investment) to Black and other minority neighborhoods, often using government-backed maps that literally drew red lines around "hazardous" areas, leading to disinvestment, blight, and the displacement/destruction of vibrant communities for projects like freeways, creating lasting segregation, wealth gaps, and environmental injustice.



On **Thursday, Feb. 5 at 6:30 p.m.**, Dr. Jennifer Vannette, Outreach Coordinator from the Castle Museum of Saginaw County History, will be at **Hoyt** to discuss **Saginaw: Race & Riot**. This talk will examine the historical conditions that led to this moment and how they produced an uprising in 1967. We will also consider why understanding this period in history still matters today.

Black Migration to Saginaw

Dr. Willie McKether, author of **Better Lives, Broken Promises, and the Struggle for Equality: Lessons from the Black Migration to Saginaw** will discuss his study of three generations of African American Migrants at **Hoyt** on **Saturday, Feb. 7 at 1 p.m.**

McKether's book focuses on the Black migration to Saginaw that came in two waves between 1915 and 1960. The social landscape for African Americans coming north at the start of the second half of the last century changed drastically, based upon a foundation laid by the migrants arriving in the first half of the twentieth century. This book suggests that the earlier cohort served to fill the social spaces created by the pre-1915 migrants and learned how to 'get by' in a society that offered few real opportunities for its Black citizens. The second wave arrived after World War II into a society that promised more, even as it failed to deliver. As a result, demands for social justice within the local social structure became louder.
